#### **Keynote Speakers**



Dipesh Chakrabarty teaches at the University of Chicago, where he is the Lawrence A. Kimpton Distinguished Service Professor of History, South Asian Languages, and the College. His interests span Modern South Asian history and historiography, postcolonial studies, theory and history, globalization, climate change and human history. He is the author of *The Climate of History in a Planetary Age* (Chicago, 2021), *Provincializing Europe: Postcolonial Thought and Historical Difference* (Princeton, 2000) and many other monographs. He is the recipient of the 2014 Toynbee Foundation Prize and the 2019 Tagore Memorial Prize awarded by the Government of West Bengal. He has been awarded honorary doctorates by the Ecole Normale Superieure, Paris (2021) and University

of Antwerp, Belgium (2011), in addition to a DLitt (Honoris Causa) by the University of London (2010). He is an Honorary Fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities (2006) and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (2004).



James English teaches at the University of Pennsylvania, where he is the John Welsh Centennial Professor of English and the Founding Director of the Price Lab for Digital Humanities. His research interests include Twentieth-century American and British literature, postcolonial literature and global anglophone studies, critical theory, digital humanities, history of material texts, modernism and modernity, sound studies, transatlantic studies, and visual cultures. He is the author of Literary Studies and Human Flourishing (Oxford, forthcoming), Beauty by the Numbers (forthcoming), The Global Future of English Studies (Wiley-Blackwell. 2012), The Economy of Prestige: Prizes, Awards, and the Circulation of Cultural Value (Harvard, 2005), and Comic

*Transactions: Literature, Humor, and the Politics of Community in Twentieth Century Britain* (Cornell, 1994).

# **Plenary Session Speakers**



**Hoonsung Hwang** (Dongguk University, Korea) is currently a Honorary Professor of English Dept. at Dongguk University. His research interests covers postmodern drama, theater semiotics and absurd drama. His publication includes, *A Semiotic Approaches to Theater*(1999), *Death in Western Literature* (2015 awarded with Wooho lietrary prize), *The Evolution of Modern English Drama* (2021).



Minwoo Yoon (Yonsei University, Korea) received a Ph D in English from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and is currently a Professor of English at Yonsei University in Seoul, South Korea. He served as president of MEMESAK (Medieval and Early Modern English Studies Association of Korea), and president of ELLAK (English Literature and Language Association of Korea). Yoon has published articles on "The Battle of Maldon," the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles, Bede's Ecclesiastical History of English People, the Canterbury Tales, Piers Plowman, and the Arabian Nights, Shakespeare's Sonnets, etc. His most

recent papers in progress are "Troubadour Lyrics, the Gay Science and Ethics of the Other," "Petrarch's Misreading of Dante," and "Development of Scientific Technology and Thoughts on the End." He has been also interested in J.R.R. Tolkien's Fantasy Literature and the Storytelling in Contemporary Learning.



**Joewon Yoon** teaches American literature and gender studies in the English Department at Korea University. Her recent publications include "'Affronting the Destiny': Narrative and Gender Performance in *The Portrait of a Lady*" (2021), "The Enigmatic Text/Other and a Queer Reading: Melville, Freud, and Bartleby" (2019). She also translated into Korean Judith Butler's *Precarious Life* and Leo Bersani's *The Freudian Body*.

#### **Invited Speakers**



Colleen Lye is an associate professor of English at UC Berkeley, USA. Her interests include 20th-/21st-century literature, Marxism and postcolonial theory, and Asian American Studies. She is the author of After Marx: Literature, Theory, and Value in the Twenty-First Century (Cambridge, 2022), and America's Asia: Racial Form and American Literature (Princeton, 2004). She has edited special issues of Representations (2007; 2011), MLQ (2012), and the South Atlantic Quarterly (2011).



Joe Cleary is a professor of English at Yale University. His interests span Irish literature, postcolonial studies, and modernism/modernity. He is the author of *The Irish Expatriate Novel in Late Capitalist Globalization* (Cambridge, 2021), *Modernism, Empire, World Literature* (Cambridge 2021), *The Cambridge Companion to Irish Modernism* (editor; Cambridge, 2014), *Outrageous Fortune: Capital and Culture in Modern Ireland* (Field Day, 2007), and *Literature, Partition, and the Nation State: Culture and Conflict in Ireland, Israel, and Palestine* (Cambridge, 2002).



**Seo Hee Im** is an assistant professor of English at Hanyang University, where she teaches modern and contemporary Anglophone literature, critical theory, and histories of the English novel. She is the author of *The Late Modernist Novel: A Critique of Global Narrative Reason* (Cambridge, 2022) and her articles have appeared in *MLQ*, *Novel*, *Modernism/modernity Print Plus*, and *New Literary History*.



Christopher Fan is an assistant professor of English at UC Irvine. His interests span Asian/American literature, global Asias, and science/speculative fiction. His work has appeared in journals such as *American Literary History, American Quarterly, Journal of Asian American Studies*, and *Journal of Transnational American Studies*.



**Lloyd Pratt** is a Drue Heinz Professor of American Literature at the University of Oxford. His interests include 19C American Literature and African-American literature. He is the author of *The Strangers Book: The Human of African American Literature* (UPenn, 2015) and *Archives of American Time: Literature and Modernity in the Nineteenth Century* (UPenn, 2010).



Chang-Hee Kim is a professor of English at Yonsei University at Wonju in South Korea. He received his doctorate in English from the Univ. of Minnesota in 2009. His recent interest focuses on science fiction, medical humanities, and disability studies based on theories and criticisms of new materialism and Asian American studies. In 2023, his chapter "A Material Turn of 'Japs' in John Okada's No-No Boy" will be published in a forthcoming co-edited book, Literature and Health Humanities, published by the Univ. of Toronto Press.



**So-rim Lee** is a Korea Foundation assistant professor of Korean Studies at University of Pennsylvania. Her interests span Korean Studies, feminism, and performance studies. Her work has appeared in journals such as *Television and New Media*, *TDR/The Drama Review*, and *New Theatre Quarterly*.



Jin-kyung Lee is an associate professor of Korean and Comparative Literature at UC San Diego. Her research interests include nationalist culture and politics of the colonial era, militarism and development in post-colonial South Korea, representations of gender and ethnicity, Asian labor migration in South Korea and Korean diaspora. She is the author of Service Economies: Militarism, Sex Work and Migrant Labor in South Korea (Minnesota, 2010). Her work has also appeared in journals such as positions: east asia cultures critique, The Journal of Korean Studies, and Acta Koreana.



**JiHae Koo** is an assistant professor of English at Kookmin University, South Korea. Her research interests span 19-20c Anglo-American fiction, digital humanities, and online feminism. Her work has appeared or is forthcoming in *Configurations, Journal of Victorian Culture, Feminist Media Studies*, and *International Journal of Communication*.



**Benjamin Morgan** is an associate professor of English at the University of Chicago. His interests include Victorian literature, science and literature, and the environmental humanities. He is the author of *The Outward Mind: Materialist Aesthetics in Victorian Science and Literature* (Chicago, 2017). His work has also appeared in journals such as *Victorian Studies, Boundary 2 Online, New Literary History*, and *American Literary History*.



**Pamela Banting** is an associate professor of English at the University of Calgary. 

He is the authors (co-authors) of many journal articles and book chapters and has made numerous conference presentations. He also served as guest-editor (or coeditor) for, and contributed articles to, special issues on diagnostic language assessment for the two international journals, *Language Testing* (2015) and *Language Assessment Quarterly* (2009), and guest-editor on TEPS history and research for one Korean journal, *Language Research* Journal (2019).



**Seok-Moo Choi** is a professor in the Department of English Education at Korea University. His research interests include James Joyce, contemporary Irish fiction, children's literature, critical literacy, postcolonialism, and disability studies. He is currently at work on a project entitled the Irish in the British Empire.



Ha Jun Ryu, is a G-TELP Korea researcher with experience and passion for creating English language proficiency tests for the post-COVID era. His research interests include researching, developing and refining language assessment tools, understanding how EFL learners acquire the English language, and how tests can be designed to maximize a candidate's language acquisition.

Woo Soo Park is professor of English at Hankuk University of Foreign Studies. He is the honorary president of the Rhetoric Society of Korea and was the former president of the Korea Association of Classical, Medieval, and Renaissance English Literature. He is the editor in chief for the *JELL*, and is also on the editorial board for *Shakespeare Review*, and *Rhetoric*. He has published many articles in *Rhetoric Review*, *Quarterly Journal of Speech*, and the *Journal of Multicultural Discourses*. He is the author of the article, "East Asian Rhetoric" in the Blackwell Encyclopedia of Communication and Rhetoric. His article, "Shakespeare Studies in North Korea," was published in *Shakespeare* 

Bulletin. Among his most recent publications is the book, Shakespeare and the Drama of Passions (2022). His book publications include Shakespeare's History Play: Language, Irony and Structure, and some other books on Shakespeare and English Renaissance Drama. He has translated into Korean Shakespeare's major plays and poems, and I.A. Richards' The Philosophy of Rhetoric.



Michael Allan is the editor of Comparative Literature and serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of World Literature, Philological Encounters, Comparative Literature Studies, Critical South Asian Studies, the Journal of Digital Islamicate Research, and Syndicate Lit. He was elected a member of the executive committee for LLC Arabic (2017-2021) and a delegate of Twentieth and Twenty-First Century Comparative Literature (2019-2021) for the Modern Language Association, and currently serves as the Publications Chair for the American Comparative Literature Association. He has been a EUME Fellow at the Forum

for Transregional Studies in Berlin (2011-12, 2017-2018), a Townsend Fellow at the Townsend Center for the Humanities in Berkeley (2006-7), and a Presidential Intern at the American University in Cairo, where he worked with its Institute of Gender and Women's Studies (2000-1). For two summers (2011-12), he was the site director for the CLS Arabic Program in Tangier, Morocco.



Tina Chen is the founding editor of Verge: Studies in Global Asias, founding director of Global Asias Initiative, and the author of Double Agency: Acts of Impersonation in Asian American Literature and Culture, which was named a CHOICE Outstanding Academic Title in 2005. Her national leadership roles include stints as the co-Chair of the East of California caucus for the Association for Asian American Studies, serving on the Executive Board of the MLA's Division on Asian American Literature.

"I am interested in speculative fictions, the imaginable ageography of Global Asias, and the genres of academic labor. I was initially

trained as an Asian Americanist but over the last decade, my work has focused on exploring the possibilities and limits of theorizing "Global Asias" as an epistemology and method that simultaneously recognizes and challenges the distinctions separating area studies and diaspora studies. As the founding editor of Verge: Studies in Global Asias, an award-winning journal that brings Asian studies, Asian American studies, and Asian diaspora studies into non-aligned relation, and the founding director of the PSU Global Asias Initiative, I am committed to developing platforms that encourage multidisciplinary engagement and the cross-pollination of knowledge across disciplinary and field boundaries. I am currently working on two books: Tactics and Theories for a Global Asias Praxis, a collaborative project that will be published as the inaugural volume of a new Global Asias book series with the University of Hawai'i Press, and Alien Forms: Global Asias and the Speculative Genres of Academic Labor, a monograph that questions the ways in which academic labor has been parsed into the categories of "research, teaching, and service" and argues for a more expansive notion of scholarly work."



**Thomas O. Beebee** is Edwin Erle Sparks Professor of Comparative Literature and German, Penn State University. Beebee's fields of specialization include criticism and theory, epistolarity, eighteenth-century literature, translation (theory, practice, and literary mimesis), mental maps in literature, and law and literature. Publications include *Clarissa on the Continent* (Penn State Press 1991), *The Ideology Of Genre* (Penn State Press 1994), *Epistolary Fiction in Europe* (Cambridge UP 1999), *Millennial Literatures of the Americas*, 1492 – 2002 (2008); *Nation and Region in Modern European and American Fiction* (Purdue UP 2008).

His most recent books are *Conjunctions and Disjunctions of German Law and Literature* (Continuum 2011), *Transmesis: Inside Translation's Black Box* (Palgrave-MacMillan, 2012), and the edited volume *German Literature as World Literature* (Bloomsbury, 2014). Beebee is editor-in-chief of the journal *Comparative Literature Studies*, and general editor of the *Bloomsbury Series, Literatures as World Literature*.



Julia Flanders is a professor of the practice in English and the director of the Digital Scholarship Group in the Northeastern University Library. She also directs the Women Writers Project and serves as editor in chief of Digital Humanities Quarterly, an open-access, peer-reviewed online journal of digital humanities. Her apprenticeship in digital humanities began at the Women Writers Project in the early 1990s and continued with work on the development of digital humanities organizations such as the Text Encoding Initiative and the Alliance of Digital Humanities Organizations. She has served as chair of the TEI Consortium

and as President of the Association for Computers and the Humanities. She has also taught a wide range of workshops on text encoding and served as a consultant and advisor on numerous digital humanities projects. Her research interests focus on data modeling, textual scholarship, humanities data curation, and the politics of digital scholarly work. She is the co-editor, with Neil Fraistat, of *The Cambridge Companion to Textual Scholarship*, and the co-editor, with Fotis Jannidis, of *The Shape of Data in Digital Humanities: Modeling Texts and Text-based Resources* (Routledge, 2019).
