1. A straight wire of radius R carries a current I parallel to the wire which is uniformly distributed across the wire. 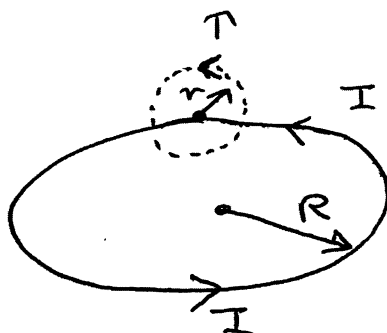

4. Using the Lorentz force law, the force on a particle with charge q moving with velocity \vec{v} in a magnetic field \vec{B} is $\vec{F} = q \vec{v} \times \vec{B}$. Which of the following statements is CORRECT:

5. Consider a wire loop lying in the plane of this page. A magnetic field pointing out of the page is decreasing in magnitude. Which of the following statements is correct:

10. Consider a closed surface S enclosing a volume V . The net current flowing through the surface S is $\oint_S \vec{j}(\vec{r}, t) \cdot d\vec{S}$, where $\vec{j}(\vec{r}, t)$ is the current density. A positive value for the surface integral means a net outflow of charge, and a negative value means a net inflow of charge. The total charge enclosed by the surface is $\int_V \rho(\vec{r}, t) d^3\vec{r}$, where $\rho(\vec{r}, t)$ is the charge density. Conservation of charge requires that $\oint_S \vec{j}(\vec{r}, t) \cdot d\vec{S}$ is equal to:

- A. $\int_V \rho(\vec{r}, t) d^3\vec{r}$
- B. $\frac{d}{dt} \int_V \rho(\vec{r}, t) d^3\vec{r}$
